

He has led performances of the Bloomington Symphony Orchestra, the Kenwood Chamber Orchestra, The Chamber Music Society of Minnesota and The Musical Offering.

Schrickel joined the double bass section of the Minnesota Orchestra in 1976 and became assistant principal in 1995. He has performed twice as soloist with the Minnesota Orchestr under the baton of Leonard Slatkin. 

Dominick Argento - Fire Variations

Paul Hindemith - Symphonic Metamorphosis of Themes by Carl Maria von Weber

Johannes Brahms was the first composer to create an entire symphonic work in the theme and variations form, and his Variations on a Theme of Joseph Haydn is one of the core masterworks of the orchestral repertoire. Minneapolis' own Dominick Argento is one composer who fell under the spell of Brahms' great work. Argento's Fire Variations features a theme from his own opera, Great Expectations, and each variation relates to the corresponding variation of Brahms' composition. Music Director William Schrickel and the MSO complete this season-opening program with a performance of Symphonic Metamorphosis, Paul Hindemith's brilliant and virtuosic reworking of themes composed by an earlier German master, Carl Maria von Weber.

Johann Sebastian Bach composed nearly 1100 works, but only one concerto for violin and oboe. Violinist Peter McGuire and oboist John Snow, members of the Minnesota Orchestra, perform as soloists in this Baroque jewel. Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No. 8 reveals the unbuttoned, humorous side of this most temperamental composer, including a sly second-movement tribute to the inventor of the metronome! Polish composer Henryk Górecki composed his Symphony of Sorrowful Songs in 1976, incorporating texts from a 15th century lamentation, a prayer scribbled on the wall of a Gestapo prison by a young Polish girl in 1944 and a folk song William Schrickel and the MSO are joined by soprand Lisa Habeck for this moving, contemplative masterpiece. 

Bring the whole gang for this special hour-long family concert featuring thrilling orchestral music, story-telling and visual art. Arvo Pärt - Cantus in Memory of Benjamin Britten

Benjamin Britten - Russian Funeral for Brass and Percussion

Dmitri Shostakovich - Symphony No.11 in G minor, Opus 103, (The Year 1905)

Estonian composer Arvo Pärt created his Cantus for string orchestra and church bell in 1977 following the death of English composer Benjamin Britten. Britten composed Russian Funeral in 1936, using as its principal melody the Russian revolutionary funeral march, You Fell as Victims. Dmitri Shostakovich used that same song in his Symphony No. 11, written in 1957. The work's subtitle (The Year 1905) would seem to indicate that the symphony "officially" concerns the massacre of 1000 unarmed civilians in St. Petersburg on January 9, 1905, but listeners familiar with the ambiguities of Shostakovich's music may hear a much different, more subversive piece—Shostakovich's bitter denouncement of his own Russian government's violent quashing of the 1956 Hungarian Revolution.

Hungarian composer Ernst von Dohnányi's Variations on a Nursery Rhyme, featuring pianist and MSO Solo Competition winner Darin Tysdal, is an ingenious set of variations on Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star. Linda Tutas Haugen's Transformations of Darkness and Light was premiered by William Schrickel and the MSO in July 2004. Commissioned by the National Kidney Foundation, the work closes with the beautiful, haunting sound of more than 100 chimes from St. Olaf College's Wind Chime Memorial. This final program of the MSO season concludes with Johannes Brahms' Serenade No. 1, a joyful, pastoral work that the 25-year-old composer initially conceived as a 3-movement nonet for strings and winds but later expanded into the 6-movement lyrical gem for full orchestra we know today.
