Steve Heitzeg's stirring Fanfare for Prairie Skies. Frenchman Georges Bizet's Suite No. 1 from Carmen, the second most performed opera in the world, sparkles radiantly, and George Walker's elegiac Lyric for Strings serves as the MSO's memorial to the victims of social injustice and to those struck down by Covid. Antonin Dvorak, Bohemia's greatest composer, wrote his ninth symphony while living in New York City. Subtitled From the New World and premiered in 1893, it is both a love letter to his native country from the homesick composer and a reflection of his fascination with the energy and the people of the United States.

Gustav Mahler's Symphony No. 5 is a kaleidoscopic journey from darkness and tragedy to light and renewed life. The work begins with a bipartite funeral march that is alternately mournful and vehemently angry. The central scherzo, bright and unbuttoned, features the solo horn and recurring Austrian dance rhythms. The sublime *Adagietto* for strings introduces the finale, which progresses through a complex series of exhilarating contrapuntal episodes to the symphony's cathartic, victorious conclusion.
